STEP 2

Before beginning, it's customary to give charity.



STEP 3

Light the candles, then wave your hands in three circular motions over the flames, welcoming the holiness of the New Year.

Recite the blessing:

START OFF WITH A BANG (1)

STEP 2

STEP 3

Say the kiddush blessing out loud:

START OFF WITH A BANG (2)

STEP 1

Start by putting challah on the table and covering it with a napkin.



STEP 2

Fill your cup with wine or grape juice and hold it in the right palm of your hand.



STEP 3

Say the kiddush blessing out loud:

MAKE IT SWEET



Jews are the "apple" of G-d's eye, and dipping a sweet slice into honey on the first night of Rosh Hashanah reminds G-d how we want our year to be: extra sweet!





NEW YEAR NEW FRUIT

On the second night of Rosh Hashanah, we eat a fruit we haven't tasted yet this season. It's kept on the table while lighting candles, then passed around for everyone to taste after Kiddush.

Before eating fruit, we make this blessing:

בְּרוּהְ אַתָּה ה' אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶהְ הָעוּלְם בּוֹרֵא פְּרִי הָצִץ

Ba-ruch a-tah Ado-nai E-lo-hei-nu me-lech ha-olam bo-re pri ha-etz.

Blessed are You, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who creates the fruit of the tree.

Before eating the apple and honey, add this "pretty please" prayer for a super sweet year:

Ye-hi ratzon she-ti-cha-desh alei-nu shanah tovah u-m'tu-kah.

May it be Your will to renew for us a good and sweet year.

THE ULTIMATE



G-d finished creating the world— it's time to celebrate!

STEP 1

All year long we are used to fresh, delicious challah, but on Rosh Hashanah we eat it with a twist—literally. Instead of braiding the loaves, strands are spiraled into a **round shape**, symbolizing new year blessings that go on forever.

STEP 2

We eat sweet, juicy pomegranates that are bursting with seeds, reminding us how all Jews are full of good deeds.



We taste the **head of a fish** (or ram!) for a year of staying ahead.



STEP 4

The Yiddish word for **carrots** also means "multiply"—how we want our merits to grow.

Here's how to wash hands before eating bread:



STEP 5

Fill a cup with water, then pour three times on each hand, right hand first.

Recite the blessing:

בָרוּךְ אַתָּה ה' אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶּךְּ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קַדְּשֵׁנוּ בִּמְצִוֹוֹתִיוּ, וְצִוּנִוּ עַל נִטִילַת יַדִיִם

Ba-ruch a-tah Ad-onai, E-lo-hei-nu me-lech ha-olam, a-sher ki-desh-an-u be-mitz-vo-tav ve-tziv-anu al ne-til-at ya-da-yim.

Blessed are you, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who has sanctified us with His commandments, and commanded us concerning the washing of the hands.

HE ULTIMATE

STEP 6

Shhh! Washing hands and eating bread is one long ritual, so no talking in between.



STEP 7

The leader of the table recites the blessing out loud.

Recite the blessing:

בְּרוּהְ אַתָּה ה' אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶהְ הָעוֹלֶם, הַפּוֹצִיא לָחָם מִן הַאָּרִץ

Ba-ruch atah A-do-nai, E-lo-hei-nu Melech Ha-Olam, hamotzie le-chem min ha-ar-etz.

Blessed are You, L-rd, our G-d, King of the universe, who brings forth bread from the earth.



STEP 8

Dip the challah in honey before eating, for a year that's sweet as can be.

The shofar serves as an alarm clock, awakening our spirit and reminding us of the very real and powerful voice of our soul.



WHAT IS A SHOFAR?

A shofar is a trumpet made from the horn of a kosher animal with the marrow removed. The central mitzvah of Rosh Hashanah is to hear the shofar being blown.

WHEN AND HOW TO BLOW THE SHOFAR

The laws of blowing the shofar are quite complex, and should be done by one who is proficient and skilled. The shofar is not blown on Shabbat.

WHY DO WE BLOW THE SHOFAR?

The shofar signifies the coronation of G-d as our king. Like in the times of old, when rulers were coronated with the blast of the trumpet, the shofar announces our commitment and resolve to be a dedicated and better Jew.

The shofar also gives us hope, foreshadowing the sound of the "great shofar" that will call together the Jewish people from all corners of the earth at the time of the coming of Mashiach.
